New variants of old viruses notwithstanding, here at the Center for Italian Studies we are as active as ever, as we are getting ready for the big event of the year: the dedication of our spaces to the founder of the Center, Mario Mignone.

The fully renovated Mario B. Mignone Center for Italian Studies will host a naming ceremony, and a conference aimed at celebrating its Director's many talents, on September 8-10 of this year; mark your calendars, because you are cordially invited to participate in the festivities. We intend to demonstrate, once more, that *il mondo* è *bello perché* è *Mario*.

Planning for the big event does not mean that we are neglecting the line-up for this Spring: as usual, conferences, film screenings, and book presentations are planned by keeping in mind that we need to meet both the needs of a community of students and researchers, and the desire for cultural enrichment of the constituency that underpins us. You will find a detailed calendar inside, but notice that the program may be subject to change, or we may add events later in the season: I recommend you keep an eye on the Center's website and on our monthly webzine.

The strength of the Center lies in the generosity of its benefactors: it is thanks to them, thanks to you, that we can offer such an array of events, and provide a substantial support to the students in the Italian and Italian American Studies programs. The Dr. Vito and Carolyn De Simone Endowment established a Visiting Lectureship in Italian and Italian American Studies that supplements our course offerings with topics of interest, like "The Italian American Experience in Literature" and "Images of Italian Americans in Film." Similarly, the recently established UNICO – Roy S. Dragotta Endowment strengthens the teaching capabilities of the Italian Program at Stony Brook in a crucial moment, when many U.S. institutions of higher education are reducing their commitment to language courses. The Dr. Michael De Luca Endowed Student Excellence Fund for Italian Studies rewards exceptional Majors and Minors in the program in Italian Studies; recipients in 2021 were two students of remarkable capability and talent (and with a 4.0 GPA): Alisa (Alice) Fomina and Anita Rescia. The Richard Nasti Lecture Series in Italian and Italian American Studies funds, among other events, an annual encounter with renown Italian intellectuals: recent guests of the series were the film director and ethno-musicologist Gianfranco Cabiddu, and the Hong-Kong based author Valentina Giannella. You can find the recordings of our stimulating conversations on the Center's website. The Joseph Tromba Lecture Series established a fund for an ongoing lecture series: this semester the Center will host Anthony J. Tamburri, Dean of the Calandra Institute, to discuss with our students and the community his recent book The Columbus Affair: Imperatives for an Italian/American Agenda. The Francesco P. and Dina D'Alto Malgeri Endowment in Italian Culture has funded, in 2021, the Dante Series, and this semester it allows us to bring to campus two scholars interested in Italian sculpture, Grégoire Extermann and Carolina Mangone, in March. The **Roberto and Palmina Mi**gnone Endowed Fellowship, and the Josephine Fusco Endowed Fellowship in Italian and Italian American Studies generously support the Graduate students in the Italian program. The John F. Lauro, P.A. Fund will stimulate interdisciplinary research and educational and community events that focus on the Italian cultural heritage and on the Italian American contribution to our country. The anonymous donor who established the Italian Language Instruction Fund allows us to offer Italian classes at a subsidized rate: check the information within if you want to take advantage of this opportunity to study Italian in a relaxed setting.

We are forever grateful to all our donors, big and small, who allow the Center to function and return events of added value to the community, such as the Italian club, the various film series, the annual high school essay contest, and the Concorso d'Eleganza (if you've missed it, check the videos on our website from the 2021 edition, the most attended ever).


