Freshly painted walls, clean carpets, and new elements of furniture in the lecture room and in the library grace our spaces, in time for the beginning of the semester. The renovation of the Center for Italian Studies is completed! Or, almost... we still have to put the books and other resources back in good order onto the new shelves; but rest assured – by the time you come to visit for our first event, everything will be in place.

And we truly hope you visit. Thanks to our donors, and to the cooperation with the D'Amato Chair and other institutions on campus, we are, once again, capable of offering an intense line-up of events which, as per the tradition, are addressed both to the community of students at Stony Brook and to the Center's constituency at large.

We start with the XVI edition of the *Concorso d'Eleganza*. This edition, sadly, marks the passing of Robert D. Cess, the professor of Marine Sciences who sixteen years ago approached the Director of the Center, Mario Mignone, with the idea for such a show. In the following years the *Concorso d'Eleganza* has seen the participation of over a thousand of vehicles; and in 2021, after a COVID-related hiatus, we had our most attended edition ever. This year, the stakes are even higher. Come showcase your Italian-made work of art on wheels, or just peruse the *parterre* enjoying refreshments and live jazz.

This fall, the Center will host two exceptional guests with distinct intellectual profiles: the Italian-Egyptian rapper and author Amir Issaa will visit in the first week of October, while the writer Dacia Maraini, one of Italy's most influential public intellectuals, will deliver a lecture at the beginning of November.

On November 10, 11, and 12 the Center will host the Memorial Conference in honor of its founder and Director of forty years, Mario B. Mignone: many of his friends and colleagues will convene from all over the world to applaud his achievements. Please mark the date; it will be a wonderful opportunity for the whole community to celebrate Mario's work, and to consider the future of his legacy.

There's more: you will find a detailed calendar inside; but be aware that the program may be subject to change, or we may add events later in the season. I recommend you keep an eye on the Center's website (www.stonybrook.edu/italianstudies) and on our monthly webzine.

We are all very happy to welcome two additions to the Center, the incoming Executive Director, Matteo Brera, and Alicia Ryan-Meuschke, the new Center Administrator. Matteo Brera holds degrees from the Universities of Pavia, Edinburgh and Utrecht and has worked - both within academia, and in the private/not-for-profit sectors - in the United Kingdom, the Netherlands and Canada, before being selected as the new Director among many highly qualified candidates. The recipient of a Marie Curie Global Fellowship with a project on the hier-archisation of racism, memory and the construction of the racial discourse in the US South, Matteo has also published extensively on Italian and European literatures, Fascism, and the political impact of ecclesiastical book censorship.

In June of this year, we welcomed Alicia Ryan-Meuschke as the administrator for the Center of Italian Studies. Alicia is not *brand new* to the University, as she comes to us as a Stony Brook alumna with a BA in Linguistics and MA in Forensic Linguistics. Her professional background consists of experience in event management, community outreach, community service, non-for-profit management, higher education, and student leadership. She has already been working hard on planning a robust schedule of events for the fall semester for all to enjoy! Because she is of Italian descent herself (and had started her undergraduate career as an Italian Language major here at SBU), she is excited to be working for the Center and looks forward to interacting with our students and community.

One last thing: if you are wondering why the costs for the Italian Classes for the Community that we organize are so low, keep in mind that they are sponsored by an anonymous donor. Maybe, this is the semester when you, too, can take advantage of this program to acquire or refresh your Italian language skills.
