Industry Professionals Inspire MFA in TV Writing Students





Working professionals from all over the industry have made their way to Stony Brook to chat with students about their exciting work. As part of the T.V. Writing Guest Series, **Laura Eason**, showrunner of *Three Women*, spoke about creating a series with a specific female gaze and how <u>surrealism can be utilized to emphasize emotional moments</u>. The hit series on Starz is based on the bestseller by **Lisa Taddeo**.





Working MFA in T.V. Writing alumni **Emma Gombas**, **Sam Nosratian**, and **Mallory Baysek** spoke to a sold-out audience about their experiences with Showrunners **Debora Cahn** on *The Diplomat*, **Tom Fontana** on *Monsieur Spade*, and **Bash Doren** on three new series. They discussed their paths to break into the industry and how they leveraged their MFAs in TV Writing to launch their careers following graduation.

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Linas Phillips, a script doula, visited the *Post-MFA T.V. Writing Incubator* to guide writers in character development. He introduced techniques for exploring character backstories and interpersonal dynamics, challenging writers to dig deeper into their characters' psyches.
