New Faces Around the Department

We welcomed two new faculty and one new staff member to our department this fall! We look forward to the research, teaching, and advising expertise they will be able to bring to our undergraduate and graduate students.

Stephanie DeMora Assistant Professor in American Politics



Dr. DeMora joins our department from the University of Pennsylvania, where she was the **Arlin M. and Neysa Adams Postdoctoral Fellow** at the Annenberg Public Policy Center where she worked closely with Dr. Dolores Albarracin. She holds a PhD in political science from the University of California, Riverside, as well as MA and

BA degrees from the University of Arkansas, and an AA from Gloucester County College.

Dr. DeMora's research investigates the psychological drivers of political engagement and behavior of underrepresented groups. Her work is published in top journals such as the *Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences, British Journal of Political Science, Political Behavior, Public Opinion Quarterly,* and *Political Research Quarterly,* among others. DeMora is also co-author of *Motivating Black Turnout with Celebrations of Community* (New York University Press, in press), and *Family, Friends, and Political Beliefs: Examining the Facts* (Bloomsbury Academic, under contract) as well as a contributor to *The Cambridge Handbook of Political Psychology* (Cambridge University Press, 2022).

Eric Groenendyk Professor in Political Psychology

Dr. Groenendyk received his PhD in political science from the University of Michigan in 2009. He received his BA in Political Science and Communication Studies with highest honors from the University of Michigan in 2001.



He was previously a Dunavant Professor of Political Science at the University of Memphis.

Eric Groenendyk's research examines the motivations that underlie opinions, beliefs, communication, and behavior in politics. He is particularly interested in the norms associated with identity groups, the goals made salient by the context of politics, the nature and dynamics of party identification, and the influence of emotion in politics. His work has been published in numerous journals, including *American Political Science Review, American Journal of Political Science, and Journal of Politics.* His book, *Competing Motives in the Partisan Mind*, was published by Oxford University Press.

Ashley Porcello Undergraduate Program Coordinator

Ashley Porcello is a three-time alum of SBU, and joined the Department this past May. She holds a BA in Italian Language and Cultural Studies with a minor in International Studies; an MA in Higher Education Administration; and an MA in Public Policy. As a student employee here, Ashley worked in multiple offices across campus including the



Office of Undergraduate Education, the Reservations Office in the Student Activities Center and the Graduate School's Finance and Administration Office. Celebrating Our Graduates' Achievements

On Thursday, May 16, 2024 we hosted our annual convocation and reception in the Bauman Center Ballroom. There were speeches by the 2024 Distinguished Alumni Award Recipient **Sean F. Conroy, JD, PhD '03, MAPP,** and graduating senior **Siya Majmundar '24**. The Martin B. Travis award was given to two graduating seniors with plans to attend law school: **Madelin Silva '24** and **Johan Arias Chacon '24**. One hundred fifty nine students were recognized for completing the degree requirements for the Bachelor of Arts in Political Science, one for completing the Master of Arts in Political Science, thirty three for completing the Master of Arts in Public Policy, and two for completing the PhD in Political Science.



Sean F. Conroy, Specialist Director Mission Team for the Microsoft Corporation, was selected as the 2024 recipient of the Distinguished Alumni Award for his extensive achievements in the armed force and government, as well as private business.

During March 2018, Sean Conroy joined Microsoft after many years working as a civilian for the Department of the Air Force. Except for 20 months serving as Chief of Staff for Microsoft Federal's Department of Defense Account Unit, he has solely focused on bringing bestof-breed cloud-enabled solutions to bear against the

challenges the US Government encounters each day. He concentrates on using technology to provide decision support for actions from acquisition through deployment.

"My approach to teaching is that each student has their own unique set of strengths and weaknesses. I believe that it is an instructor's responsibility to cultivate individual assessment addressing these traits that builds a foundation for students to progress to advanced study in the field, while emphasizing data and best-evidence over ideology and partisan tribalism. Giving extensive, detailed feedback to students' errors and mistakes and providing them an opportunity to redraft and correct their work is the crucial component to promoting a

grasp of course material and cultivating rigorous analysis."

Remembering Frank Myers, Distinguished Teaching Professor



It is with great sadness that we share the passing of Frank Myers, a distinguished member of the Political Science Department of about six decades, on June 2.

Myers joined Stony Brook University in 1966, after earning his Bachelor's of Arts degree from UC Berkeley in 1958 and PhD from Columbia

University in 1965. Myers' PhD focused on British politics, and he later went into analyzing rhetoric of speeches and arguments made by political leaders.

He was the Chair of the Department of Political Science for two terms, Dean of the Division of Social and Behavioral Sciences, and Dean of International Programs, and was on multiple university committees. He was truly committed to his students, the department, and the university.

Derek O'Connor, BA Political Science and History '09 and current Workforce Development Manager in Stony Brook's Office of Economic Development, took classes with Myers' four times during his time as an undergraduate.

He describes Myers and says "Everyone knew he was brilliant, but he was able to share the information in the most inclusive way possible. He would share information for everyone's purpose, not to show off." In O'Connor's last year as a student, he enrolled in Myers' political philosophy class, not because it was of interest to him, but because he felt a need to take Myers' class no matter what he was teaching. O'Connor saw it as "an opportunity to learn because he [Myers] could really make any topic sound so interesting."

O'Connor says Myers was "committed to the university's role in shaping the next generation. He really pushed everybody to be better leaders, and conscious thinkers forever." Even though O'Connor did not go into the field of political science, he still uses skills taught by Myers and became more of a reader. Milton Lodge, a distinguished professor emeritus int the Department of Political Science, was a colleague and close friend of Myers for over 50 years. Both professors started at Stony Brook University around the same time. They became fast friends at the University, and their families grew close as well.

Lodge recalls that Myers would get letters from students years after teaching them talking about the impact he had on them. "He was a great teacher and an amazing colleague," says Lodge.

Lodge compares Myers to a "Renaissance man whose grasp of history, philosophy, and music enlightened us all."

In his time at Stony Brook University, Myers was recognized for his dedication and excellence to his students and was recognized for this with a promotion as a Distinguished Teaching Professor, the highest honor SUNY can grant in recognition of dedication to teaching. Myers also received the Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Teaching and frequently won the department's Excellence in Teaching award (later named the Frank Myers Award, in his honor.)

Frank Myers left a mark on his students, the department, and the entire university. His presence will sorely be missed, but his legacy and impact continue in the students he taught.

How Certain Groups React to Slight Census Change of Significant Impact: "Validating White' Reactions to the 'Racial Shift'"

After observing the "racial shift" present in the media, census, politics, and more, Assistant Professor **Andrew Engelhardt**, PhD Candidate **Nicole Huffman**, and PhD Candidate **Veronica Oelerich** look into White Americans' response to it in their research paper titled, "Validating Whites' Reactions to the 'Racial Shift." The "racial shift" is the declining percentage of non-Hispanic white people in the population.



Assistant Professor Engelhardt's research focuses on using political psychology to understand how multi-racial democracies tackle challenges related to inclusion and inequalities. He looks into how individuals' attitudes about social groups develop and/or change. PhD Candidate's, Nicole Huffman, research interests are in group identities. It is also in how race and gender impact legislative behavior and communication and the individual's reception of legislative behavior and rhetoric. PhD Candidate's, Veronica Oeletich, research falls under political psychology, behavioral political economy, and American politics, with an interest in collective action.

Their paper reveals that, contrary to previous experiments and literature, there is no change in White Americans' perception of threat, shift towards conservative policy, nor a lack of heterogeneity in political affiliation as a result of the "racial shift."

They surveyed 2,100 non-Hispanic White Americans of various age, sex, and region. Respondents first answered questions, including about their partisanship, prior to reading a hypothetical news article. Results from the pre-treatment are to be compared to the posttreatment items to find any potential differences in reactions towards the "racial shift" if people identified as Democrats or Republicans. Then the respondents were assigned to read one of four hypothetical news articles the researchers wrote to reflect the Census and media stories motivating their work. The four articles were a population racial shift, a political racial shift, a cultural racial shift, and the placebo condition. After reading their assigned article, respondents answered questions about it and various political topics.

There are no treatment effects, as none of the conditions changed the respondents feelings towards racial groups or partisanship. In their research, there is little evidence supporting pre-existing evidence of a population shift treatment increasing status threats and promoting conservative attitudes.

However, the researchers do not think that Whites are unaffected by the "racial shift", and encourage others to replicate their experiment.

"Validating Whites' Reactions to the 'Racial Shift'" was presented at the 2024 APSA Annual Meeting in Philadelphia, PA in September, and is in the process of being published in the *Journal of Experimental Political Science.*
